CYCLING AND WALKING IN SOMERSET

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Somerset

From the Mendip Hills in the north, to the Quantocks in the west and the Blackdowns in the south, Somerset is a county of contrasting landscapes and moods, offering many attractions to visitors keen on exploring its rich heritage and delightful countryside.

For walkers and cyclists seeking a relaxing rural jaunt, the Somerset Levels are perfect touring country, with their meandering quiet lanes and hill-free landscape. These ancient wetlands, rich in wildlife, are home to one of Somerset's oldest traditional skills - willow basket weaving – an important craft for the production of a wide range of items from lobster pots to hot air balloon baskets!

For those who prefer the challenge of mountain biking and hill sports, the Quantocks, Mendips and Exmoor all provide exhilarating opportunities to test your stamina against the hills and discover some fantastic views.

For the historically minded visitor, the county is a positive treasure trove. There are dozens of fine old churches and historic towns and villages, such as Wells, with the gothic grandeur of its wonderful 12th-century cathedral and the nearby moated Bishop's Palace with its famous bell-ringing mute swans. Classic steam trains run along the West Somerset Railway, the UK's longest privately-owned passenger line, to the coastal towns of Watchet and Minehead.

For those with a love of myth and legend, Somerset can fascinate you with the legend of King Arthur. The Iron Age hill fort at South Cadbury is the alleged site of Camelot and at Glastonbury Abbey, the ancient monks claimed to have found the remains of this warrior and his queen, Gwynevere. At Athelney stands a monument to another monarch, King Alfred, reminding us of where he burnt the cakes.

There's so much more to Somerset than just its history. From donkeys on the beach to quaint shops in small towns, or wide open spaces with wildlife all around, there is something here for everyone - and it can all be seen best by bicycle or on foot. www.visitsomerset.co.uk



Yeovil

Situated in beautiful countryside on the Somerset/Dorset border just west of the River Yeo, Yeovil is the major town of South Somerset. Once noted for its 300-year-old glovemaking industry, it is now better known for more modern businesses such as Westland,



one of the world's largest helicopter manufacturers, as well as for being home to the world famous Fleet Air Arm Museum at nearby RNAS Yeovilton. However, despite its commercial growth, Yeovil's thriving street markets confirm that it is still a country town at heart.

For those interested in the past, Yeovil's long history is evident everywhere, from the large Iron Age fort atop Ham Hill to the naming of its modern pedestrian shopping precinct, The Quedam, to reflect the town's Roman roots. The Museum of South Somerset at Hendford houses many fascinating exhibits and artefacts, giving its visitors the opportunity to trace the changing face of Yeovil through the ages.

Nearby, at the foot of Hendford Hill, the area surrounding the beautiful Nine Springs has recently been transformed into a country park. With pathways meandering through beech woods and waterside walks around a delightful spring-fed lake, it is an idyllic setting popular with both local residents and visitors. Barwick Park, just south of the town, is also well worth a visit to see its four strange follies – Jack the Treacle Eater, the Needle, the Fish Tower and Messiter's Cone.

Yeovil also accommodates Somerset's only football league club, Yeovil Town FC, which has a long tradition of giant-killing in the FA Cup. The club plays at Huish Park, which is located to the north of the town.



Other places of interest easily reached by bike from Yeovil include the delightful formal gardens of 17th century Tintinhull, the Elizabethan grandeur of Montacute House (left) and the Fleet Air Arm



Cycling advice

GENERAL

- Always abide by road regulations Make sure you can start, stop, and the Highway Code.
- Make sure your bike is well maintained and roadworthy
- Be visible. You must use front and rear lights after dark and may wish to consider wearing reflective or bright clothing.
- Wear appropriate footwear and clothing and consider wearing a helmet.
- Carry a good quality lock and make sure you secure your bike if leaving it.
- Cycle route signs are generally white on a blue background.

Moving Forward is a Somerset County Council initiative aimed at reducing congestion and pollution in Somerset. By raising



awareness and encouraging wider use of sustainable travel alternatives such as walking, cycling, car share and public transport, we can protect and improve our environment, our health and our quality of life.

Did you know that the majority of car trips are less than 2 miles? These days it's all too easy to just hop in the car without thinking, even when we're only popping round the corner. RIDING ON THE ROAD

- signal confidently with both hands and check behind without wobbling before riding on the road.
- Always ride within your own ability.
- Ride about 1m out from the kerb to avoid drains, litter and glass in the gutter and to make yourself more visible to following traffic.
- Think ahead and try not to make sudden moves or changes in direction. Anticipate obstacles and turns ahead and position yourself appropriately in good time. Act decisively and do not be afraid to assert your position on the road.
- Give way to pedestrians, wheelchairs and horse riders.
