Blue print for a better future for young people

Children and young people helped launch a document recently that will shape the way Somerset County Council and its partners support them over the next three years. Their voices were central to the creation of the Children and Young People's plan for 2019-22 which outlines the challenges and dangers they face.

Supporting children and young people, keeping them safe and improving their lives, is one of the most important roles the Council and its partners in health and the police undertake.

The plan is there to help them achieve this and highlights issues like exam stress, difficulties in education, lack of opportunities, bullying, abuse, exploitation, poverty and self-harm and family problems.

Children and young people from across Somerset took part in a series of workshops and helped draw up the plan and set its priorities. Some of them include better health provision and access to affordable activities to support health and wellbeing, support for parents, useful training and social skills, and ensuring schools and colleges were safe places.

The Plan's overall vision is for Somerset's children and young people to be happy, healthy and preparing for adulthood.

Her fondness for guinea pigs - many of them rescue animals, and her pet pugs has become a colourful cottage industry which she runs with her friend Bridget Traynor.


